TOURIST MAP OF MALAPPURAM








The beach serves as a major tourist destination in Malappuram and a perfect getaway for families during evening.



Emerald islands cradle a symphony of wings - the Kadalundi Bird Sanctuary. Over 160 species of feathered souls, among them 60 migratory species gracing these shores from afar, paint the skies with vibrant life from December to April. Gulls and terns tango in the azure above, sandpipers tapdance on glistening shores, while cormorants dive like ebony arrows. The Malabar hornbill flickers through the mangroves like a crimson flame, while kingfishers and darters spear the shimmering depths.

Located in Valiyakunnu Grama Panchayat, the Kadalundi is spread over a cluster of islands. Below, a silent ballet unfolds. Mussels gleam like scattered pearls, crabs click their cryptic tunes, and fish weave schools of liquid silver. Boat rides organised by the Forest Department allow visitors to traverse through rustling leaves and lapping water, accompanied by birdsong lullabies for the soul. Kadalundi is more than wings; immerse yourself in its emerald embrace, let feathers be your compass. It is home to a variety of fauna and flora.



It reignited the spark in the potters' eyes, urging them to reimagine their clay-kissed legacy. These eco-friendly wonders captivated the hearts of modern designers. Aruvacode's pottery soared beyond homes, adorning museums and galleries. This hamlet welcome s you with its rustic charm along with artistic realm.







The water, born from the icy breath of the Western Ghats, whispers tales of untamed wilderness as it plunges into the crystal embrace of the pool. The air, unburdened by the city's smog, paints the canvas of your lungs with invigorating purity.

The Keralamkundu waterfalls, also known as Kalkundu or Karuvarakundu waterfalls, are accessible by road from Malappuram and Shornur. For the most comfortable journey, consider hiring a jeep to Karuvarakundu village. For the adventurous soul, a trek through the dense greenery unveils Keralamkundu's secrets. To experience its safe and serene charm, avoid the monsoons, and plan your visit between October and May. Bathe in its icy touch, a kiss from the mountain mist, and let the symphony of water wash away your cares.

Surving as the major waterfall, the Keralamkundu is the first destination in Malappuram district to be included in the national adventure tourism map. The Natmug Valley, known for castor plantation is located about 1 km away.



n Nilambur's emerald embrace, where sunlight whispers secrets to ancient trees, lies Conolly's Plot, a sanctuary sculpted from time and teak. This, one of the world's oldest surviving teak plantations, hums with the soul of a bygone era, its story etched in every gnarled tree bark and rustling leaf.

Named after H.V. Conolly, a visionary who saw the worth of these timber giants, Conolly's Plot is more than just a verdant tapestry. It's a haven for weary souls, where the air vibrates with the song of rare birds and the symphony of exotic insects. Ancient branches, draped in vibrant green, weave a cathedral of light and shadow, their whispers carrying tales of empires and of ships that graced distant shores.

And then, there's *Kannimara* Teak, the undisputed leader of this verdant kingdom. Standing tall for over 170 years, *Kanimari* is named after a tribal woman who nurtured the sapling's thirst. Each ring on its weathered bark speaks of seasons turned, storms weathered, and the silent symphony of Nature's grand design.



Nilambur, located close to the Nilgiri range of the Western Ghats on the banks of Chaliyar River is blessed with an environment suitable for the thriving growth of teak trees. The furniture made here has a high demand due to the outstanding quality of teak wood and wood art works. The greatest time to visit Nilambur is from December to February as the climate is pleasant and cool.

An exclusive stretch of plantation in Conolly's Plot offers a rare view of the oldest teak trees. You can also avail of the Nilambur Teak Museum to discover more about the benefits of teak wood. As you walk forward to the museum, you can relax in the beautiful garden and children's park. The museum showcases teak crafts comprising furniture and wood samples.

The Adyanpara Waterfall, located in Kurumbalangode Village in Nilambur gives a picturesque of water splashing from a massive boulder to the ground fully encircled by vegetation.



It was in 1964, the Thunchan Parambu of Tirur in Malappuram was converted into Thunchan Memorial Trust and Research Centre in honour of the Father of Malayalam language, Thunchath Ezhuthachan. Shreds of evidence of the revered poet's existence are well preserved in the memorial to showcase the evolution of Malayalam language. Introducing the style of 'Kilipaattu', translating to 'the song of a parrot', he gave birth to the epics Adhyatma Ramayanam and Mahabharatham. You can witness the iron stylus used by him and a bronze sculpture of a parrot displayed in the memorial.

A good number of people come here for the annual 'Vidyarambham' ceremony to mark their children's beginning to the world of letters. The monument comprises a trust office, research centre, literature museum, manuscript library, indoor auditorium, and conference room apart from an outdoor stage, Saraswathi mandapam, children's library, children's library, guest room, rest room, and open spaces. The Kanjira Tree, which sheltered Ezhuthachan while writing and meditation are also protected.




Aravana Mutt:






Kolkali upholds the pride of Malabar where the fast rhythm of striking sticks and songs synchronise with the special movements, performed by a group of 12 - 24 men.
